CN Symington Yard Noise Update by Don Blasko

Further to our Summer 2022 newsletter report, the committee is still in mediation with CN and Transport Canada (TC) to resolve the excessive train noise.

We have met virtually with CN and TC numerous times during the past year. The meetings are confidential until such time as all parties agree to disclose the information. Therefore, we cannot provide all the details that have been discussed.

To date, CN has pursued multiple proposals and has contacted a company with expertise in resolving train squealing noise successfully in other countries. This company's first step will be to determine if their solution will work for our location. Are the conditions at Symington similar to the railways in other countries where their solution worked? They will need to access weather conditions, size and weight of the train cars, and volume of traffic.

We purchased a sound meter and have been actively monitoring sound levels. Readings were taken daily over several weeks, at various times of the day and night. Readings have ranged from 50 to 100 DBLs (decibels). A normal range is considered 70 DBLs. The higher readings, although not constant in nature, are still very disturbing and annoying, especially at 2 AM.

Did you know that the railway is exempt from the City of Winnipeg's anti-noise bylaw?

Alternatively, if mediation does not work, and we cannot agree on a solution, we can pursue judication. This process involves us presenting our case to Transport Canada. The presentation would need to address the below items:

- 1. Any legislative documentation that governs the applicant.
- 2. A clear statement of the issues.
- 3. A full description of the facts.
- 4. The relief claimed.
- 5. The arguments in support of the application.

This is a last resort, but if we were to proceed with judication, we would require additional community support for this committee, preferably someone that has experience in this area.

If we were successful with judication, Transport Canada would order CN to correct the problem.

Transport Canada will only conduct the investigation once it has been satisfied that the parties have tried and exhausted all the collaborative measures as set out in their mediation guidelines.

As it stands, we will continue with mediation and work together towards a solution.



A New Playground for Southland Park!

Our current MLA, Audrey Gordon has been nothing less than stellar when it comes to advocating for improvements for our development. I'm not saying this to swing your votes, it's just the truth. Audrey spent countless hours discussing our playground with City Councilor, Russ Wyatt as well as guided us through the grant application process so that we might be successful. And we were! We were awarded \$100,000 towards Phase 2 of the Multi-Use Activity Space in Lagimodiere Park.


The Province of Manitoba's grant program was the Arts, Culture and Sport in Community Fund, specially the Small Capital and Special Initiatives Grant Program. This program requires the applicant to meet certain criteria in order to apply. Along with that, the focus is on arts, culture or sports programming and/or activity. Seeing as a playground is considered an active area, the fitness component ties in nicely. The grant funds up to 50% of eligible costs.

With this information in hand, the City of Winnipeg, Urban Planning and Design Division, drafted several proposed designs and budgets.

Councilor Russ Wyatt, has committed \$170,000 towards replacing the playground equipment.

A total of \$270K gives the City of Winnipeg a good start in replacing the playground plus adding a fitness area.

While the plans are not yet finalized, the City hopes to have something available for your review at this year's Community BBQ.

Notes: Bank accounts have been combined into one operating account. Admin costs rose significantly in previous years but are expected to decrease in 2024. The 2023 Community BBQ was funded 100% from a grant from the Province of Manitoba. Thanks to that grant, we now expect to end the year with a significantly higher bank balance than our original budget of \$6,000.

2024 Budget was built to maintain and continue existing projects, such as the front signage flowerbed, the boulevard planters and an annual community BBQ.

Depending on what happens with the New Playground design, we may need to contribute some funds, like we did with the Half Basketball / Pickleball Court. I have set aside \$10,000 for this in the 2024 Budget.


Budget will be voted on at the AGM on September 10, 2023 (5pm). See you there!
